Interviews: Because You're More Than Just Your GPA

Planning to transfer? How about a summer internship? You look at the job description and you think "Yes! I want to do this," and then you read further down to the recruiting process and your heart stops at a single word: **INTERVIEW**.

Many of us have never had a face-to-face interview before, and a million questions swirl in your mind. What should I wear? What is a "professional" handshake? Should I bring a notepad and a pen? Would a pencil be better? And then, after you're done with all the preparations, you realize you haven't even started thinking about the actual interview: What questions are they going to ask? How am I going to reply them?

Why Interviews are your friend?

No matter what you are applying for, you can be sure that every other applicant has submitted the same amount of paperwork you have. So how do you set yourself apart? This is where the "interview" comes in play. It's your one-

on-one time with the company, your chance to show them your strengths, and why, paperwork aside, you can be a valuable contribution to the organization.

What is a "Mock Interview"?

A hypothetical simulation of an interview environment, typically lasting between 20 and 30 minutes, followed by a period of feedback from the interviewer, and an opportunity for the interviewee (you) to ask questions.

Why do "Mock Interviews"?

Mock interviews are like rough drafts meant to prepare you for real interviews. You can have a friend, classmate or even a Cañada faculty or staff help you. The more experience you have with interviewing, the better prepared you will be when applying for scholarships, jobs, internships or transferring. You can look for popular questions to different scenarios online. Use flashcards and quiz yourself. You can never be *too* prepared!


A day filled with surprise and fun is coming, April Fool's Day! Do you know how this day came to be? As a matter of fact, no one knows exactly how this day began

What in the World do I do with My Major?




The ancient Mexican new year will be celebrated on March 14-15 in Emma Prusch Park 647 S. King Road in San Jose. A new wave of young Latinos are embracing the spiritual beliefs and traditional customs of their ancestors.

"It's not just a little dance," said Yei Tochtli Mitlapilli. "It's a movement about identity and spirituality that were repressed for centuries but are now coming back." The event celebrates Ome Tochtli, the year of Two Rabbit in the Aztec calendar. But it's also meant to showcase the indigenous diversity of the Bay Area.

Aztec dancers will kick off the festival and a tianguis, or bazaar, will feature vendors and exhibitors offering traditional flutes, drums, clothing, and CDs.

Mexica is what the Aztecs called themselves in their native language. The word also morphed into the name of the country after "New Spain" did not stick. Even so, the Mexica new year virtually disappeared under centuries of Spanish rule and Roman Catholic doctrine.

The Aztecs frequently named their children according to the calendar. On Sunday, Mexican calendar scholar Sergio "Ocelocoatl" Ramirez Munoz will conduct a naming ceremony by finding traditional names for a select few according to the day and time they were born.

Are you a highly motivated student who wants to challenge yourself? Are you a student who is not satisfied with getting an A, but is willing to exploring more into a specific topic? Are you a student who wants to be more competitive when you transfer? Join the Cañada College Honors Transfer Program (CCHTP) and take honors classes!

Why join CCHTP? What are the benefits of completing

CCHTP? Firstly, being a member of Honors Transfer Program, you get priority registration for classes. Secondly, CCHTP are members of the UCLA Honors Transfer Alliance Program (TAP) and the Honors Transfer Council of California HTCC so they offer transfer agreements that provide priority admission to UCLA.

What are the requirements to apply to be in the CCHTP?

The two criteria for being qualified are:

- Be eligible for transferrable English (ENGL 100) and Math (MATH 125, 130, 140, 200, 222, 241, or 251).
- Have a high school GPA of at least 3.5 or a cumulative college GPA of 3.3 in at least 9 units of transferrable courses.

How do I apply to be in the CCHTP?

You could submit an online application here: www.canadacollege.edu/honorsprogram/application.php

How do I register for Honors classes? The program offers different honors classes every semester, so you should check on WebSchedule. An Honors class is indicated with this icon: You can also register for a regular class and sign an Honors contract with your professor. Keep in mind that UCLA Tap transfer program only accepts two honors contract classes.

How to be an Honors graduate student?

Complete 15 units of Honor classes!

Always plan ahead if you want to graduate as an Honors student and start early. Challenge yourself and you will learn more! Good luck!

How to Apply for SMCCD Scholarships

Scholarships are a great opportunity to help pay for tuition and get recognition for your hard work! There are several different types of scholarships available and luckily only one application. Here are some tips to help you apply!

What are the steps to applying for a scholarship? A scholarship application requires you to submit 1) an online application, 2) an unofficial transcript showing your current GPA, 3) recommendation letters from a SMCCD faculty and/or staff, and 4) a personal statement.

When is the best time to apply? The sooner the better! The DEADLINE to submit all the application and all necessary documents is THURSDAY, FEBURARY 12th. In my experience, the best time to ask faculty for recommendation letters is a month before the semester is over. At this time your professors should know you well enough to write a thoughtful recommendation, without having the pressure of preparing for finals upon them.

What if you think your professor forgot about your recommendation? Most professors will want to complete your recommendation as soon as you ask, but others like to take their time. Remember faculty have tons of other responsibilities outside of class, and they might have other students who asked them for a recommendation. Be patient. If you don't see that their recommendation letter is complete on the scholarship application, you can always ask. Be understanding. Phrases like "Let me know if there is any information you need from me" or "If there is anything I can do to help please let me know", will let your professor know that you're interested and understanding and at the same time serve as a friendly reminder.

What if I'm not a straight A student? You don't need to have an A in the class to ask for a recommendation. In fact, that's the whole point! Recommendations are a way for professors to get to know you as a student, and as a human being, something a grade can't tell. If you know you've done your best, and if the teacher knows you're a dedicated student, you can be certain they'll include that in your recommendation, and in most cases, this quality may have more weight than your grade.

If you don't prepare well you may get overwhelmed and stressed, so it's always a good idea to plan before the semester starts but it's never too late to plan NOW. I want to share my lessons learned from previous semesters. Getting ready is the best way to overcome any obstacle in your first semester at Cañada College, and to be successful! - 1. If you are still thinking about adding one more class, go to the class and ask the professor for an add code. Remember that February 4^{th} is the LAST DAY TO ADD CLASS AND GET PARTIAL REFUND.
- 2. Keep an eye on your My.SMCCD email and WebAccess, in case your professors send emails about important announcements and stay on top of your deadlines for homework and assignments.
- 3. You definitely should complete your SEP (Student Educational Plan) with an academic counselor as soon as possible. You could schedule an appointment to meet with a counselor at the Welcome Center in Bldg 9, 1st Floor. Having an updated SEP is really beneficial in helping you be prepared because it gives you a priority registration date, since courses always get filled up quickly.
- 4. Mastering time management skills can make your life easier. Organizing and planning things ahead of time will be extremely helpful. Here are some things I've tried to manage my time as a student, a club officer, and a Student Ambassador. Use a planner or calendar in your phone when there is a lot going on. Write down everything on it, such as deadlines, dates of exams and events on campus. For me, I like writing down the dates of final exams after I get my syllabus and due days of assignments once my professors announce them.
- 5. Most importantly, getting enough sleep and arriving 10 minutes before classes start will definitely help you.
