Empowering Young Minds

High school students bring curiosity and energy, making ethnic studies discussions on race, ethnicity and justice both engaging and impactful. These courses encourage critical thinking and a vision for a more just society.

Adaptability in Teaching

Dual enrollment challenges educators to refine their teaching strategies, using creative solutions like online research tools to enhance accessibility. Structured guidance builds confidence, fostering deeper engagement with complex topics.

Building Confidence for Higher Education

Early exposure to college-level coursework helps students see themselves as capable scholars. At Pescadero High, one student even applied their learning to advocate for improvements in their town's water system, demonstrating real-world impact.

Advice for Educators

For faculty considering dual enrollment, flexibility, creativity and differentiated instruction are key. Encouraging revision and critical thinking fosters deeper learning, while embracing students' enthusiasm makes teaching truly rewarding.
