Building Community & Practicing Radical Love at the CaCCCHE Drive-In Conference

Last Friday, Cañada College had the honor of co-leading and hosting the annual California Council of Cultural Centers in Higher Education (CaCCCHE) Drive-In Conference, bringing together educators and professionals from community colleges, UCs, CSUs and private universities across California. The event centered on ho'oponopono—deep healing, reconciliation and connection—through meaningful discussions, reflection and shared experiences. Highlights of the day included conversations on supporting Indigenous and Oceania communities, a two-spirit medicine drum circle led by Wakan Wiya, and inspiring insights from esteemed speakers, including Dr. Manuel Alejandro Pérez, Dr. Michiko Kealoha and Dr. David Ga'oupu Matthew Palaita. Thanks to a partnership with the CaCCCHE board, all Cañada participants attended free of charge. The day concluded with attendees leaving with new knowledge, strengthened connections and a plant to nurture as a symbol of ongoing growth.

Creating Comfort, One Blanket at a Time



PBC Adopts New Institution Set Standards

The Planning & Budgeting Council reviewed the College's goals and metrics at its meeting on Wednesday, as well as during its meeting on December 4, 2024. As a result, it adopted <u>updated goals and metrics</u> for the next five years that align with and help support the implementation of Cañada's Education Master Plan, accreditation requirements, and the State Chancellor's new Vision 2030.

Beta Zeta Nu Explores Morality and the Macbeth Effect in Award-Winning Research Project

In 2024, the Beta Zeta Nu (BZN) chapter of Phi Theta Kappa (PTK) at Cañada College conducted a research project titled "Can You Scrub Away Sin? The Psychological Underpinnings of the Macbeth Effect." Grounded in the theme "Fables, Folklore, and Fairy Tales" and inspired by Shakespeare's *Macbeth*, the study explored the psychological phenomenon where individuals feel compelled to cleanse themselves physically when their moral purity is threatened. The project involved interdisciplinary collaboration with the Drama, English, Psychology, Math and Business Departments, along with the Library staff and Middle College High School Program. Professors Palmer, Budd, Ekhtiar and Monarres, drama students and Middle College faculty provided essential support.

Experiments and Findings

- Cleansing Word Experiment: Students primed with moral dilemmas were twice as likely to choose cleansing-related words like "soap" in a word-completion task, supporting the Macbeth effect.
- Macbeth Priming Experiment: Drama students performed guilt-laden scenes for participants, but the results did not confirm the effect due to possible design flaws.

Campus Impact

- This project engaged 165 participants and demonstrated the value of combining STEM, Humanities and Social Sciences to better understand human behavior and morality.
- The Drama Department will stage Macbeth as their spring play.
- English faculty incorporated lessons on the Macbeth effect into their curriculum.

For PTK members—who are primarily STEM and Business majors—the project was transformative. It underscored the importance of interdisciplinary approaches in addressing complex societal issues. By integrating social science, humanities, and biological perspectives, they deepened their understanding of morality and behavior.
