Office of Equity: MA and Ed.D. Educational Justice Opportunities

Last Friday, the Office of Equity hosted an event in the Cultural Center that highlighted local opportunities to garner an Master's (MA) and Doctorate (EdD) in Educational Justice. Five University of San Francisco professors and current students came to campus to talk about what being in a Master's program in Human Rights and Educational Justice as well as possibilities in a Doctoral Program in International and Multicultural Education (with concentrations in Human Rights, Racial Justice or Language & Culture) could look like for our students, faculty and staff. The group discussed what curriculum and activities look like and spoke to how alumni utilized what they learned to invoke justice in their communities. Attendees also covered how staff could utilize professional development funds towards garnering a degree. The 20 attendees also received an application fee waiver for USF by coming to the Cañada College workshop.

Luis Valdez Inspires the Campus Community with the Power of Storytelling

The Puente Project at Cañada College was honored and excited to welcome Luis Valdez, playwright, teacher, director, social activist and founder of El Teatro Campesino, to speak to a room full of Cañada College students, faculty and staff on Wednesday. Luis Valdez shared inspirational anecdotes that offered insight into the importance of creativity, community, and theater. He also shared his history with Cesar Chavez, their involvement in the Chicano Civil Rights Movement of the 1960s and 1970s, and the lessons learned that could be applied to today's struggles for justice and equity. He concluded his talk by reciting a poem in three different languages: English, Spanish and Nahuatl, an indigenous language from Central Mexico. "Tu eres el otro yo," he proclaimed. "This is the basic Mayan principle we have extracted from our study of Mayan culture. If I love and respect you, I love and respect myself. If I do harm to you, I do harm to myself." Summarizing the poem's message, Valdez addressed the audience, "America find your heart and save your soul."







Womxn of Color Collaborative Domestic Violence Education Workshop

The Womxn of Color Collaborative Domestic Violence Education Workshop, in partnership with Community Overcoming Relationship Abuse (CORA), provided an informative and supportive space for learning about domestic violence awareness and prevention. Participants engaged in discussions on the impact of abuse, available resources and ways to support survivors in their communities. The workshop emphasized the importance of advocacy, safety and healing for individuals of all backgrounds. It was a powerful opportunity to foster awareness and collective action against relationship abuse.



Cañada in the News: New Exhibit at the Cañada Art Gallery

Art Professor Emilio Villalba and the current exhibition in the Art Gallery was recently featured in 48hills.org, official publication of the non-profit San Francisco Progressive Media Center. Running Through May 15, the Cañada Art Gallery (located in Building 9, Room 152) is presenting the works of Paul Wonner (1920-2008) and Theophilus Brown (1919-2012), two significant figures in the Bay Area Figurative Movement. This intimate exhibition brings together paintings and drawings from the private collection of San Francisco collectors Matt Gonzalez and Kelly Egan. The collection offers a unique perspective on both artists' work, spanning over five decades. Gonzalez, who shared studio time with Brown, and his wife Egan have thoughtfully assembled these 18 works, providing a rare glimpse into the artistic evolution of these influential California artists.
